Activity Overview

A design comp is an electronic drawing that shows a detailed design of project, like a web page. In this activity students will learn how design comps are used in the design and development process, especially when working with clients, and how to create them so they can present multiple design ideas.

Activity Steps

- 1. Introduce the concept of a design comp, an electronic drawing that shows a detailed design of project, like a web page. Discuss how design comps are used in the design and development process, especially when working with clients. 1.3, 1.3, 1.5, 1.6 Show a sample design comp to discuss and emphasize the following:
 - Mood: A comp is the first impression of what a project will really look like. The comp should immediately convey an appropriate message, such as fun, serious, youthful, organized, trendy, or family-oriented.
 - Color: Colors should be well coordinated, fit the mood and tone of the project, and provide enough
 contrast for legibility. Show Adobe Kuler (http://kuler.adobe.com) to students and explain how they can
 use this web service to create and save custom color palettes for any design project. If creating a webbased project, discuss web-safe colors and decide whether it's appropriate for students to design only
 with web-safe colors.
 - Fonts: Vary fonts sparingly to be effective; consider how size and weight draw attention. Discuss that most projects are designed with one or two fonts, using size, color, and boldface for further distinction. Make sure the contrast between the font and background colors is adequate to make the text legible. If creating a web-based project, discuss which fonts are common on Windows and Macintosh operating systems.
 - Images: Images reflect content and mood. Photographs should be of highest quality. Text used with an image should be close enough to be visually associated with the image. An organization logo should be properly positioned, sized, and so on.
 - Text: The biggest challenge is to use only as much text as is necessary to convey key messages. Organize the text so visitors can scan it to find relevant information, especially web visitors who are more likely to skim than to read carefully.
 - Navigation elements: Buttons, menus, and navigation bars should all reflect the project's mood and integrate effectively with the overall colors, fonts, and images for the project.
- 2. Ask each team to make two or more design comps of their project using Photoshop. Refer to the *How to create design and layer comps* Photoshop guide ^{3,2} for technical instruction on how to create design comps. Encourage teams to create comps that show varying perspectives of the project. If working on a web project, remind them to consider the value of consistency between the home page and the content pages.^{2,3} Teams can also utilize the sample design comps in the *design-comps.zip* electronic file. If teams have more than one wireframe for multiple viewing devices, have them create a design comp for each wireframe.
