Working with interactive media elements

Activity Overview

Interactive media is used to enhance the user experience. In this activity students will learn how to evaluate uses of interactive media, determine when to use it, and learn how to add video, audio, and other interactive media elements to a web page.

Activity Steps

- 1. Explain that interactive media is used to enhance the user experience. Discuss how interactive media advertising consists of using a combination of graphics with video, audio, or animation. An example is banner ads.
- 2. Show students websites that use interactive media and discuss how designers use it to help support the purpose and goals of their web project. Discuss how the device the audience will view the website on will influence the use of interactive media and what elements you can include in the site content and design. Some elements to discuss include:
 - Navigation systems
 - Integrated user interface
 - Animated screen elements
 - Interactive media advertising
 - Social media
- 3. Discuss the purposes for implementing content as interactive media.^{1,2,2,1} You might include the following: Incorporating audio and video
 - Providing transitions
 - Providing consistency
 - Illustrating change over time
 - Getting multiple layers of information from one part of the display
 - Enriching graphics representations
 - Visualizing three-dimensional structures
 - Attracting attention
- 4. Introduce and discuss Adobe Flash, Adobe Edge Animate, JavaScript, CSS3, and other interactive media tools and their ability to create animation and interactive media. Discuss and analyze with your students what kind of interactive media they can realistically create for their client sites.^{4.8}
- 5. Discuss the best practices for adding video, audio, and other interactive media elements to a web page. Discuss the difference between HTML 5 and Flash video, especially for older browsers that don't support HTML5 and mobile devices that may not support Flash video.
- 6. Distribute the technical guide and using the sample electronic files, demonstrate the following:
 - How to insert Flash and HTML5 video into a web page.
 - How to add Flash SWF files to a web page and edit them from within Dreamweaver.
 - How to add audio to a web page.
 - How to add HTML5 animated content to a web page

- 7. Ask students to use the sample electronic files and insert all or some of them to a web page. Alternatively ask them to add interactive content to a web project they are currently working on.
- 8. Explain that when they are working on any web-based project they should evaluate the use of employing interactive media to enhance their user experience. Additionally, depending on the devices used, they should identify and/or create the necessary interactive media element and use the skills they learned to properly insert them.
